

Department of Tourism, Culture and Recreation Backgrounder Year-End Provincial Tourism Performance 2008 and Early Tourism Outlook 2009

Tourism Performance 2008

Highlights:

• From January 1, 2008 to December 31, 2008, there were an estimated 480,100 non-resident visits to Newfoundland and Labrador, **a decrease of 2.0%** over the same period in 2007. Non-resident tourism expenditures in the Province from January 1, 2008 to December 31, 2008 were estimated to be \$369.3 million, an increase of 3.3% over the same period in 2007.

- The small decline in visitation (-2.0%) experienced during 2008 followed the -1.3% decline recorded during 2007. This decline in two consecutive years was in contrast to the growth cycle experienced between 2003 and 2006 (average annual growth over this time period was 4%). The decline in 2008 is attributed to fewer non-resident automobile and cruise visitors which offset the increases recorded in non-resident airline visitors.
- Airport passenger movements at the Province=s six major airports increased 5% during 2008 to 1.8 million passenger movements. Increases have been recorded for Gander (+33%), Wabush (+21%), Deer Lake (+6%), St. John's (+3%) and Goose Bay (+2%) while decreases were recorded at St. Anthony (-2%) and Stephenville (-1%).
- Based on these estimates, non-resident airline visits increased 3.7% to 346,200 for the period ending December 2008. The increase in air arrivals has arisen in part because of an increase in

air access as measured by the total number of flights and airline seats available in the peak travel season of 2008.

- Total Marine Atlantic ferry passenger traffic in 2008 reached approximately 387,600 passengers, a decrease of -7% compared with 2007. Non-resident auto visitors decreased by -11% for the period January 1, 2008 to December 31, 2008 to approximately 114,100 travellers. Residents exiting the province via Marine Atlantic also declined -3% compared to last year.
- As noted the number of non-resident automobile visitors traveling to the province decreased 11% over last year's levels. This increase is being driven by less visitors from the province's primary target markets of Ontario (-15%) and to a lesser extent from the Maritimes (-7%). The number of automobile visitors decreased from all other geographic origins as well and included declines from the United States (-18%). Automobile traffic from the United States has dropped steadily for the last seven years (2002 to 2008).
- Cruise Newfoundland and Labrador reported 102 port calls during the 2007 cruise season, down from 105 recorded in 2006. Even with the small drop in port calls, passenger and crew visits reached 36,885 and 18,546 respectively, increases of about 8% each over the 2006 cruise season. During the 2007 cruise season, 45 different communities (26 Island portion, 19 Labrador) in the province received at least one port call in 2007, up from 35 different communities (20 Island portion, 15 Labrador) during the 2006 season.
- Unique cruise ship visitors (a count of one regardless of the number of port calls made by the visitor) during 2007 reached 19,800 a decrease of -31% over levels achieved during the 2007 cruise season, The number of unique cruise ship visitors has been trending upwards for the period 2003 to 2007.
- The Meetings, Conventions and Incentive Travel (MC&IT) market in Newfoundland and Labrador remained solid during 2008. Major meeting and convention activity, for those exceeding 50 delegates, in the St. John's destination area increased significantly over 2007 levels with an expected increase of over 16,000 delegates to about 36,400 for 2008 marking a record high. While the number of delegates increased, the number of conventions decreased from 100 last year to 78, reflecting a rise in the number of relatively large conventions.
- Based on available information (90% return rate as of January 27, 2009), 2008 roofed accommodation occupancy rates for the Province increased 3.3 points over the previous year. Occupancy levels, during 2008, increased at least one point in all regions of the province with the exception of Eastern region. Specifically, increases were reported for the Avalon Peninsula (+2 points), Central region (+3 points), Western region (+4 points) and Labrador (+8 points). Occupancy levels decreased -1 point in the Eastern region. These figures will be adjusted as final data for 2008 is received from operators.
- Between January 1, 2008 and December 31, 2008 the Department of Tourism, Culture and Recreation received 73,771 inquiries for travel guides and related material from all sources including web, e-mail, telephone and other correspondence. In addition 859,232 visits were registered at the province's tourism website www.newfoundlandandlabrador.com Compared to the same time period in 2007, this represents a 13% increased interest in Newfoundland and Labrador as a travel destination.

Early Tourism Outlook 2009:

 Performance in the Tourism industry follows economic cycles. Despite small declines in the last couple of years, non-resident visitation to Newfoundland and Labrador has increased on average 2% annually (13% in total) over the past six years (2003 to 2008).

- 2009 will certainly be a challenging year and growth prospects, particularly in the short term
 remain uncertain as economic worries continue to spread, offsetting the positive effect of
 declining gasoline prices. The global credit crunch and continuing stock market loses have left
 many Canadian households very uncertain about general finances including plans for travel.
- According to the Conference Board of Canada, consumer confidence has fallen to its lowest level since Canada entered its last economic recession in the early 90s. All components of the index declined in the early part of the fourth quarter as survey respondents reported that it was not a good time to make major purchases (including travel). Views about their current and future financial situation continue to deteriorate.
- Consumer confidence declined in all regions of the country in November with the exception of the Atlantic (Nova Scotia being a primary market) provinces and in particular Newfoundland and Labrador. While Ontario, another primary market for province posted only a small decline in consumer confidence during November, there index has dropped significantly since September.
- According to the Conference Board of Canada Travel Intention survey (October 2008), only 39% of Canadians intended to take a winter vacation (November to April) this year, down from the 48% reported one year earlier. The largest drop was in trips to the US and other international destinations. In addition to the poor economic conditions, the weaker Canadian dollar has likely tarnished the appeal of winter trip outside of Canada.
- While the largest drop in travel intentions was for USA and international trips (above), plans for domestic trips by Canadians also fell. The decline in plans for domestic trips has fallen steadily in the last three October surveys.
- The outlook of US travel to Canada, which accounts for about 12% of the Newfoundland and Labrador market, remains weak with US consumer confidence levels near record lows, US consumers are much more pessimistic about current and future economic conditions.
- Forecasts suggest travel by US residents is on a declining trend and worsening economic
 conditions will hamper growth in US leisure travel over the medium term. Research also suggests
 that the focus will be on value with travelers choosing lower cost accommodations and
 destinations as well as taking shorter trips.
- While overall leisure travel intentions in the United Kingdom appeared to be holding steady however economic concerns have potential travelers choosing short haul destinations over trips to the United States and Canada.
- The largest travel company in Germany is optimistic about growth prospects for the winter season however higher product prices and fuel surcharges have hurt demand for long haul destinations.
 Demand for travel in the latter part of 2009 is more cautious as economic conditions worsen.
- Canada's price competitiveness is expected to increase against most competitive destinations in
 the first quarter of 2009, in large part because of the weakening Canadian dollar. The latest
 competitive price analysis suggests that while average airfares to Canada are expected to
 increase slightly from many key markets, broader increases in airfares to other destinations will
 contribute to improved price competitiveness for Canada during the first guarter.

Newfoundland and Labrador Early Outlook Information 2009:

- For the Meetings, Conventions and Incentive Travel (MC&IT) market in Newfoundland and Labrador, tentative bookings for 2009 and 2010 suggest growth in this market as bookings to date are outpacing last year's levels.
- Cruise Newfoundland and Labrador has 136 port calls tentatively booked for the 2009 cruise season so far (cited from www.cruisenewfoundlandandlabrador.com as of January 22, 2009). While more bookings are expected by Cruise Newfoundland and Labrador, this level is below the 152 port calls recorded during the 2008 cruise season. It is noted that the 2009 tentative bookings are currently ahead of 2007 port calls (102).
- Tourism inquiries and web site visits continue to be robust during the early part of 2009 as data to
 the end of January indicates an increase in the level of interest in the province as a vacation
 destination. Interest as measured by inquiries and website visits showed a 13% increase for the
 period January to December 2008.
- Looking ahead to 2009 and 2010, the province also will be celebrating two notable historic
 milestones including the Life and Voyages of Captain Robert (Bob) Bartlett of Brigus in 2009 and
 the 400th Anniversary of the founding of Cupers Cove Colony (Cupids) in 2010. The new
 Newfoundland and Labrador Tourism Vision is expected in 2009.
- Other upcoming events include the hosting of the East Coast Music Awards in Corner Brook in late February and early March 2009 and the hosting of the Juno Awards in St. John's in April 2010. Cain's Quest which is a 2,300 km snowmobile race through Labrador's wilderness will take place in March 2009 and include the communities of Labrador City, Churchill Falls, Makkovik, Postville, Rigolet, and Happy Valley-Goose Bay.

About These Statistics

The Strategic Planning and Policy Division, Department of Tourism, Culture and Recreation is responsible for the maintenance of a travel/tourism data base that permits the monitoring of various statistical indicators. This is achieved through the co-operation of many industry stakeholders and Departmental staff that provide data to the division on a regular basis. This comprehensive travel and tourism database includes as its primary/core indicators counts of marine and air passenger movements (including estimates of non-resident visitors) at the major entry/exit points in the province. Secondary indicators includes performance measures/visitation statistics for numerous facilities and sites in the province as well as the collection of detailed operating statistics for the province's accommodation sector (availability, sales, occupancy and related revenues for all licensed operators). 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Note bene: The following travel and tourism indicators are for the 2008 operating season. Comparisons are to the same time period of 2007.

Marine Atlantic

- Overall passenger traffic on the Marine Atlantic Ferry System decreased -7% during 2008 while passenger related vehicle traffic on the Marine Atlantic Ferry System also decreased -7%.
- It is estimated that non-resident automobile visits decreased -11% covering the period January to December. Traffic from the province's primary target markets for the 2008 advertising campaign (the Maritimes and Ontario) decreased -7% and -15% respectively compared to 2007 levels.
- The number of visitors from Quebec decreased -12% compared to last year while the number of visitors from Western Canada decreased -3%. The number of visitors reported from the USA declined -18. Automobile traffic from the United States has dropped steadily for the last seven years (2002 to 2008).
- Residents travelling outside the province via Marine Atlantic decreased 3% during 2008.
- Exiting bus traffic on the Marine Atlantic Ferry System decreased -3% between May and October 2008 (- 5 buses).

Airports

- Airport passenger movements at the Province=s six major airports increased 5.3% during 2008 to 1.8 million passenger movements. Increases have been recorded for Gander (+33%), Wabush (+21%), Deer Lake (+3%), St. John's (+3%) and Goose Bay (+2%) while decreases were recorded at St. Anthony (-2%) and Stephenville (-1%).
- Based on these estimates, non-resident airline visits increased 4% for the period ending December 2008.

Accommodation Occupancy Rates

- Based on available information (90% return rate as of January 27, 2009), 2008 roofed accommodation occupancy rates for the Province increased 3.3 points over the previous year. Occupancy levels, during 2008, increased at least one point in all regions of the province with the exception of Eastern region. Specifically increases were reported for the Avalon Peninsula (+2 points), Central region (+3 points), Western region (+4 points) and Labrador (+8 points). Occupancy levels decreased -1 point in the Eastern region. These figures will be adjusted as final data for 2008 is received from operators.
- Based on available information (87% return rate of January 27, 2009), preliminary commercial campground occupancy rates for May to October 2008 decreased less than 1 point (-0.5 points) over 2007 levels. These figures will be adjusted as final data for 2008 is received from operators.

Cruise

- Cruise ship passenger visits reached 32,347 during the 2008 cruise season, a decrease of -12% over the number recorded during the 2007 cruise season. A total of 152 port calls were recorded during 2008, down from the 102 recorded during the 2007 cruise season.
- A review of detailed cruise itinerary information shows the province received 19,800 unique cruise visitors (a count of one regardless of the number of port calls made by the visitors), a decrease of -31% over the previous year (2007).

Meetings, Conventions, Incentive Travel (MCIT) and Events

• The number of meetings and conventions delegates (meeting of 50 or more delegates) reported by Destination St. John's increased over last year. Preliminary data indicates an expected increase of 16,000 delegates to about 36,400 for 2008 marking a record year. While the number of delegates increased, the number of conventions decreased from 100 last year to 78, reflecting a rise in the number of relatively large conventions.

Visitor Information Centres

- The number of visitors to the system of Provincial visitor information centres between May/June and October 2008 was 95,398 a decline of -9% over the 2007 operating seasons. Decreased in visitation were reported at the majority of the Provincial centres including Deer Lake (-30%), Notre Dame Junction (-13%), Clarenville (-25%), Whitbourne (-21%), Argentia (-16%), Port Aux Basques (-14%). Increase were reported at North Sydney (+2%) and the centre at the Deer Lake Airport (+55%). The centre located at the Deer Lake Airport opened June 11, 2007.
- Visitor information services operated at the St. John's International Airport received 34,700 visitors during the 2008 operating season (January to December), a decline of -20% over last year.
- Visitor information services at the Gentara Building (Water Street) operated by the City of St.
 John's received 15,005 visitors between June and September 2008, an increase of 7% compared
 to 2007 levels. Non-resident visits increased 6% while resident visits increased 14%.

Provincial Parks and Reserves

- During the 2008 operating season there were 51,695 camping units registered at the system of Provincial Parks, an increase of 2% over the level achieved during the 2007 season.
- The number of camping units registered in the two parks located in the eastern region increased 11% to 6,818 while the number of units registered in the seven parks within the western region increased 2% to 16,890 units. The number of camping units recorded in the two parks located in the central region decreased -1% to 7,792 units while the number of camping units registered in the two parks on the Avalon Peninsula increased approximately 1% to 20,195
- Cape St. Mary=s and Burnt Cape Ecological Reserves reported mixed performance during the 2008 operating season (May 1 to October 15). Specifically the number of visitors to Cape St. Mary=s decreased 27% to 14,044 visitors while 724 visitors were reported for Burnt Cape, an increase of 11%.

Salmonier Nature Park

Approximately 30,500 people visited Salmonier Nature Park between June and October 2008, a
decrease of 7% over the 2007 operating season. General visitation and group visits decreased by
-4% during 2008 while the number of visitors associated with school visits decreased -40%.

System of Provincial Historic Sites

- The system of Provincial Historic Sites (PHS) received 47,535 visitors between May and October 2008. During this period the system of Provincial Historic Sites reported 309 groups (motorcoach/school groups etc).
- 2008 visitor counts can not be compared to visitation levels reported in previous years due to change in methodology. Only visitors entering the building (receiving tickets) were counted during the 2008 operating season. During 2007, visitor counts included estimates for people "on site" but not entering the building.

System of Regional Provincial Museums

- The Provincial System of Regional Museums reported mixed performance during the 2008 operating season. Specifically the Logger=s Exhibit received 3,518 between May and September, an increase of 9% over the 2007 operating season while Mary March Museum visitation decreased -3% to 6,191 for the May to October time period.
- Unfortunately The Seamen's Museum located on the Burin Peninsula closed June 14, 2008 due to a fire at the facility. Prior to the closure the museum reported 599 visitors.
- Approximately 5,150 visitors were reported at the Labrador Interpretation Centre during the 2008 operating season (January to December), an increase of 17% compared to 2007.

System of National Historic Sites

- Seven of the eight National Historic sites reported a decline in the number of visitors during the 2008 operating season.
- All three of the National Historic Sites in the Western Region and the Labrador Straits area reported declines during 2008. Specifically, L= Anse aux Meadows reported 25,710 visitors for the 2008 operating season, a decrease of -8% over 2007 while the number of visitors reported at Port au Choix declined -16% to 7,708. The number of visitors to Red Bay National Historic Site decreased -2% to 7,804 visitors.
- The Ryan Premises on the Bonavista Peninsula reported 7,005 visitors during the 2008 operating season, an increase of 2% over the 2007 season. This site was the only National Historic site to report an increase during the 2008 season. This increase was attributed in part to increased bus tour and school group traffic in June and July.
- Visitation to Castle Hill and Hawthorne Cottage (both on the Avalon Peninsula) also reported lower visitation levels for the 2008 operating season. Specifically, Castle Hill received 9,492 visitors for the 2008 operating season, a decrease of -8% over 2007 while Hawthorne Cottage visitation levels decreased -4% to 3,609 visitors.
- Visitation to Signal Hill (Cabot Tower) and Cape Spear (Visitor Centre) also declined during the 2008 operating season. Specifically, Signal Hill reported 54,593 visitors, a decrease of -19% over the 2007 operating season. The number of visitors reported at Cape Spear declined -28% to 19,280 visitors.

Terra Nova National Park

- Camper nights in the two campgrounds within Terra Nova National Park reached 12,059 for the 2008 camping season ending October, a decrease of 1,881 camper nights or -14% lower than last year.
- Bus tours activity at Terra Nova during the 2008 season ending October decreased compared to 2007 levels. Specifically Terra Nova received 106 bus tours down 21 bus tours or -17% lower than 2007 level. The number of passenger carried on the buses decreased -26% to 2,919 passengers reflecting a drop in load factors from 31 passengers per bus in 2007 to 28 during the 2008 season.
- Visitation to the Visitor Centre decreased -29% to 8795 for the period ending October.

Gros Morne National Park

- Camper nights in the five campgrounds within Gros Morne National Park reached 8,648 for the 2008 camping season ending October, a decline of 1,106 camper nights or -11% lower than the last year.
- The number of bus tours visiting Gros Morne decreased during 2008 season ending October. Specifically Gros Morne received 202 bus tours, a decrease of -33% over 2007 levels. Passenger carried on the tour buses reached 6,833 a decrease of -32% over the previous year.
- Western Brook Pond and Trout River Pond Boat tours also reported lower numbers during the 2008 season ending October as approximately 25,100 people reported using the boat tours, a decrease of -11% over last year.
- Visitation ending October 2008 to the Discovery Centre, Visitor Centre, Lobster Cove Lighthouse and Broom Point was also down compared to 2007 levels. The number of visitors to the Discovery Centre decreased -10% to 24,895 while the number of visitors at Broom Point decreased -7% to 6,519. The number of visitors reported at the Lobster Cove Lighthouse declined -6% to 15,446 while the number of visitors to the Visitor Centre declined -25% to 31,768.

Colony of Avalon (Ferryland)

• The number of visitors between May and October reached 20,043, a decrease of -3% over the same time period of 2007.

Cupids Museum

• The number of visitors reported at the Cupids Museum reached 2,039 during the 2008 operating season, a decrease of -16% over the same time period of 2007.

Labrador Straits Ferry

Overall traffic carried on the ferry between St. Barbe and Blanc Sablon (both directions) increased for the operating period May to October 2008 however the number of tour buses declined. Specifically passenger traffic increased 2% to 64,949 people while general vehicle traffic increased 3% to 23,434 for the same time period. The number of tour buses carried on the Straits ferry declined -17% to 130.

Arrivals from St. Pierre and Miquelon (SPM)

- Direct arrivals at the St. John=s airport by residents of SPM reached 4,298 for the period January to December 2008, an increase of 3% over the same time period of 2007.
- Direct arrivals at Fortune by residents of SPM reached 4,007 for the period May to October 2008, an increase of 7% over the same time period of 2007.
